Recent Highlights

"Blanco County Runs on Water" Art Contest: A Creative Celebration of Our Vital Resource

The recently concluded "Blanco County Runs on Water" art contest was a resounding success in raising awareness about the critical importance of water in our daily lives. This collaborative initiative engaged the local community through artistic expression and thoughtful reflection.

The contest featured two categories:

Tips for Completing New Well Registrations

Before drilling a well in Blanco County, it's crucial to obtain your property ID number from the County Appraisal District office in Johnson City and determine the exact latitude and longitude coordinates of the proposed well site. These coordinates are essential for assessing well spacing requirements, including distances from property lines, septic systems, and other wells. A completed well registration application, available at the District office or on our website, is required prior to drilling. The current fee for processing an exempt well registration application is \$100. It's advisable to consult with a well drilling company before submitting your application, as they can provide accurate GPS readings and assist with the registration details.

"Is there a well on that property?"

Realtors, prospective buyers, and others can easily research if a Blanco County property has a registered well. Start by obtaining the property's accurate street address or GPS coordinates. For properties without a visible address, use your smartphone's built-in GPS features to determine approximate coordinates.

Visit our <u>website</u> and navigate to the District Public Database under Technical Data. This Hydros online database contains records of all registered wells in the county. Use the search options for Street Address or Longitude/Latitude to locate the property on the map.

Examine the map for colored dots indicating registered wells. No dot means no registered well on the property. Hover over a dot for basic well information or click for detailed data about the well and its ownership. This straightforward process allows anyone to quickly check a property's well registration status.

District Updates

Rules Review

The District rules govern the management and protection of groundwater resources in Blanco County. These regulations are crucial for ensuring the sustainability of the region's aquifers, which are vital for drinking water, agriculture, industry, and the local ecosystem.

Key elements of our rules include permitting and well registration, groundwater monitoring, conservation requirements, spacing and production limits, drought contingency plans, enforcement, and compliance. These components work together to create a comprehensive framework for responsible water management.

The District has formed a committee to review and consider changes to current rules. This committee, composed of two directors and the General Manager, will call meetings with community stakeholders and others to discuss potential modifications and the adoption of new rules.

Any proposed rules changes will be brought to the full Board in March. Watch for announcements in the local newspapers and on the District website for updates on this important process.

These rules are essential for supporting water sustainability, protecting ecosystems, ensuring fairness, enhancing drought resilience, maintaining economic stability, and fostering community trust. They play a critical role in balancing the needs of various water users while safeguarding this precious resource for future generations.

Modernizing Our Records for Better Aquifer Management

The District is undertaking a significant effort to modernize and improve its well records. This process involves meticulously reviewing and digitizing information on over 4,000 registered water wells in Blanco County. As each file is updated, its complete contents are being uploaded to the Hydros database, creating a more comprehensive and accessible record-keeping system.

This digitization effort is crucial for the District's mission and operations, as more complete data on each well in the county provides a better basis for aquifer management. This comprehensive information enables evidence-based management practices, allowing the District to make informed decisions about groundwater conservation, preservation, and protection based on accurate and up-to-date data. This improved data management will enhance the District's ability to monitor water levels, assess aquifer conditions, and implement effective conservation strategies, contributing to the long-term sustainability of Blanco County's vital groundwater resources.
